## INTRODUCING LAB!: LEADERSHIP AT BERKELEY

This school year, a new leadership initiative is being introduced at Berkeley. Although leadership skills have always been taught in Berkeley classrooms, Upper Division is offering a dedicated leadership seminar for the first time. Starting with the Class of 2026, the Leadership Academy at Berkeley (LAB) is a requirement for students wishing

for students wishing to apply for a major leadership position in the future.

The LAB is divided into two modules—experiential and seminar. The experiential module focuses on teamwork, cooperation and communica-

tion. This module, led by Upper Division Physical Education (P.E.) Coach Sean Davidson, involves both indoor and outdoor team-building group activities. The session culminates in students climbing the catwalk of the high elements course. Belaying, or the process of steadying a climber by being their anchor on the

ground, is a task usually done by P.E. teachers. However, the LAB teaches students how to belay safely, so the entire operation is run by students. "Students are not only belaying each other, but they are 'running the show,' said Davidson. "This forces students into a situation where they have to lead the group verbally. The fact that their classmate is thirty feet up in the air and they are the primary belayer adds an element of responsibility that helps keep everyone laser-focused!"

The seminar module of the LAB takes place over two days, during which Berkeley leaders such as Upper Division Director
Ryan Jordan and Assistant Upper
Division Director Caroline Lindsey teach students about leadership skills in a classroom setting. This module emphasizes the essential skills that all leaders need to have, while also discussing the different types of leaders and communicators.
Students identify their own communication style and learn how they can use it to

their benefit.

"I love seeing the students' confidence build as they practice ways to engage in difficult conversations and further their skills by identifying their communication styles," said Lindsey. Additionally, students navigate how to have difficult conversations and manage conflicts. At the end of the module, students have the chance to work in small groups in model leadership scenarios.

The LAB has only had a handful of sessions, but it seems to be effective thus far. Avery Metheney '26, who completed the experiential module, said, "The Leadership Academy at Berkeley was an exciting opportunity to get to know some of my

peers better outside of the classroom and prepare me for the leadership positions I am striving to hold as an upperclassman." The LAB can help anyone learn about communication and leadership, and the benefits of the program go beyond helping students apply for key leadership positions.

Tourism and the arrival of new residents have risen exponentially following the pandemic. Now, Tampa is the thirdmost populous city in Florida. Tampa Magazine pointed to the appeal of Tampa's landscape, cuisine, sports and beaches. Whether

you enjoy shopping in Hyde Park, visiting museums in Downtown Tampa or running on Bayshore Boulevard—there's something for everyone in Tampa.

Although this surge in popularity seems like a benefit, some Tampa residents do not see it that way. Laura Cooper, Berkeley's Upper Division Counselor, who moved to Tampa a few months ago, said, "A lot of people are upset about people moving into [Tampa] and driving up prices. People who have lived here their whole lives now can't afford to live here."

Another Tampa newcomer, Maddy Gordon '27, had a different point of view. She said, "There's a lot of tourist attractions, but it's not just that. Tampa has so much more to offer

than it seems at first. People come for the attractions, but they stay for everything. They find the inner Tampa."

On a similar note, Houston said, "Those who have moved down aren't looking to move the wheel, they're looking to blend in. People at large care about Tampa and value all the beautiful nature and waterways we have to offer. It's still a beautiful city with a lot of history." In other words, the inner beauty of

Tampa is what draws people. Newcomers are just as invested in preserving all that Tampa has to offer as those who have lived here their whole lives.

Visit Tampa Bay suggested that Tampa's welcoming environment lends itself to a flourishing cultural blend. For example, Tampa's Hispanic

population increased following the establishment of Ybor City in the 1880s and thrived ever since. African-American contributions are celebrated every year during the Tampa Black Heritage

Festival. Finding out more about Tampa's native residents is possible through the Tampa Bay History Center. Diversity is a significant par

Diversity is a significant part of life in Tampa.

Another enjoyable aspect of Tampa is the food. For newcomers, Houston recommended historic places to get a sweet treat such as the Dairy Joy on Manhattan Avenue and La Segunda, both of which were established over a century ago. Bo's Ice Cream and Mel's Hot Dogs provide flashes of the past, while Bern's Steak House is internationally renowned. Tampa is also home to the first Outback Steakhouse.

When discussing the allure of Tampa, sports are an unavoidable topic. Often referred to as "Champa Bay," Tampa has seen great success with its major sports teams in the last few years. Just before the pandemic hit in 2020, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers found their footing and won the Superbowl with the addition of Tom Brady. That same year, the Tampa Bay Rays won the American League pennant. The Tampa Baseball Museum can be found in Ybor City, where baseball got its roots in Tampa. The Tampa Bay Lightning also took home the Stanley Cup in 2020,

then won again in 2021, marking two years in a row.

When it comes to sports, Tampa has undoubtedly made a name for itself among major sports teams post-pandemic. However, the biggest impact has been at home. Houston said, "What [our sports teams] have helped create is this small town feel where you're all cheering for a common goal—it's very impactful."

Speaking of the pandemic, Berkeley freshman Kaylee Raffington '27, who recently immigrated from Canada, suggested that Tampa's COVID policies had contributed to the increase of new arrivals over the past few years. She said, "There's a lot of restrictions in Canada during Covid. You couldn't do anything. So we came here, and we could go to school. It's a lot more free." She also added that Tampa has not only found success professionally when it comes to sports but also with its high school teams.

Houston commented on the freedom of Tampa as well. He said, "One of the best parts about Tampa is the airport. It's one of the most efficient airports in America." Cooper agreed.

When asked how he felt about people moving in, Houston said, "I welcome new people and new perspectives. [Tampa's] a great city. It's a city where you can be anything you want to be, and that's what a citizen deserves."

As advice for students who are considering joining the musical in the future, she said, "Whether you are applying for a production role or auditioning for a character—Just go for it. don't be afraid because it is such a fun experience."

Veteran Emmy Kuhn '26 performed in Mean Girls, the musical of 2023, and enjoyed it so much she wanted to be a part of it all over again. Kuhn explained that during rehearsal everyone is always working: if some people are practicing their lines on the main stage, others may be working on their choreography or vocals. ## SPINNING BACK IN TIME: ALL ABOUT THE VINTAGE VINYL TREND

Listening to music through a turntable or digging through crates at a record store sounds like activities of the past, things that you might see in an 80s movie. However, the trend of collecting and listening to vinyl records has gained popularity in the last few years, especially among high schoolers.

In the age of Spotify and Apple Music, vinyl might appear antiquated. But in an era when everything is digital, having a tangible form of music is enticing particularly to us "screenagers" at Berkeley. We grew up being able to stream music with a few taps on our phones, while general

our phones, while generations before us had to set up their record players, carefully place discs in their correct spots and patiently listen to entire albums without skipping the songs they disliked. It's the effort that makes the reward that much sweeter: the music just sounds better after you've worked for it. Listening to vinyl is an immersive and time-consuming experience, one that is a far cry from shuffling through a playlist

A unique aspect of vinyl is that it comes in different colors, shapes and sizes. Artists can choose colors that match the aesthetic of the album, such as Lana del Rey's cool green vinyl for her album Did You Know That There's A Tunnel Under Ocean Blvd, released in early 2023. Unlike the intangible online music we listen to, vinyl can be made into different shapes. Laufey, a newly popular singer-songwriter released a special heart-shaped vinyl for her fan-favorite song Valentine. Similarly, Taylor Swift released tye-dye blue and pink heart vinyl for her album Lover Live from Paris.

Many Upper Division Berkeley students are just beginning to start their vinul collections. Mia Accardi '26 said, "I have four pieces of vinul currently: folklore (Taylor Swift), Harry's House (Harry Styles), 1989 (Taylor's Version) (Taylor Swift), reputation (Taylor Swift) and Speak Now (Taylor's Version) (Taylor Swift) and definitely would like to get more." New collectors have a wide variety to choose from with many artists selling physical records. Vinul can be a significant source of income for these artists because the revenue from streaming services is minimal for musicians. Additionally, artists entice purchasers with limited edition vinuls that have special artwork or bonus tracks such as Olivia Rodrigo's vinul for GUTS. She released four different colored discs for the album, each of which contained an unreleased song.

Statistics reveal that vinyl has recently gained much more popularity. According to Billboard, the album Speak Now (Taylor's Version) sold 504,000 copies and

268,000 of those were on vinul. That is a staggering amount, especially considering that many of Swift's fans are from younger generations who have grown up listening to music digitally. The appeal of physical music is just beginning to be revealed to high schoolers. Elizabeth Lai '26 said that last year she woke up "around 4 am to go line up to buy vinyl for RSD!" The holiday she refers to is Record Store Day which was created in 2007 to celebrate independently owned record stores, and many wait in line on this day for a chance to snatch up limited edition vinul. This is a great opportunity if you want to begin or add to your collection: RSD

will be on April 20th this year.

Trends are constantly going in and out of style among Berkeley students, but vinyl is one that may stick for a while. Not only is vinyl readily available for purchase as our



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


## HAVE YOU KEPT UP WITH YOUR RESOLUTION?





Sanvi: I loved those scenes! Also, I was so excited to see Percy reaching Camp Half-Blood after the minotaur attack. One thing I noticed that was different from the books was that Percy's stepfather Gabe was less of an antagonist in the show towards Sally and Percy.

**Zoya:** Totally. I almost felt bad for him, with the "losing at imaginary poker" and all. Overall, we give this episode a 9/10. It was a great introduction to the show and definitely left me excited for Episode 2.

## **Episode 2: I Become Supreme Lord of the Bathroom**

**Sanvi:** Episode 2 kicked off with Percy's arrival at Camp Half-Blood and the introduction of new characters like Luke Castellan (son of Hermes) and Annabeth Chase (daughter of Athena). Luke was quick to welcome Percy to the camp as an unclaimed demigod in Cabin 11. Meanwhile, Annabeth maintained her distance observing Percy from afar.

**Zoya:** It was nice to see Luke acting like a big brother to Percy, but I was also so glad they included some scenes of Percy struggling to find his place at Camp Half-Blood at first. In the books, we don't get a lot of Percy's anxiety about fitting in but it was nice to see it in Episode 2. For example, we see him being bullied by Clarisse, a hostile daughter of Ares

**Sanvi:** I loved the actress for Clarisse! I feel like she portrayed the character well, especially during the scene of Percy snapping her spear in half during Capture the Flag. Author Rick Riordan put a lot of thought into his

casting, choosing talented actors who brought these characters to life.

**Zoya:** I agree 100%. On the same topic, I loved the interactions in this episode between Annabeth and Percy. You can tell the actors have great chemistry. They're the perfect pair to bring 'Percabeth' (the fans' name for the couple) to the screen.

Sanvi: The ending left the audience in suspense after Percy was claimed as the son of Poseidon at the end of Capture the Flag. As the son of one of the three major gods, Percy found himself chosen for the task of retrieving Zeus' lightning bolt to prevent the outbreak of war among the Olympians. Overall, we rate this episode a 9.5/10.

## **Episode 3: We Visit the Garden Gnome Emporium**

Zoya: This episode was pretty controversial. It covered the beginning of Percy's quest to find the bolt, as he faced monsters and other threats. We were anticipating the iconic Medusa scene exactly as the books had portrayed it, but we were robbed! In the book, Percy, Annabeth and Grover stumble upon Medusa's lair (Aunty Em's Garden Gnome Emporium) by accident and have no idea what enemy they are facing. However, in the show, they know exactly what they are walking into and willingly enter Medusa's home.

Sanvi: I agree that there is a big difference in the plot. Additionally, I noticed that Medusa's character was given more of a background, and treated as a victim rather than a monster, similar to Gabe. Medusa tells her sob story of how she was mistreated and cursed by Athena, whom she had previously idolized. A parallel between her character and Annabeth's can be observed, as Medusa warns Annabeth against idolizing her mother as she once did.

**Zoya:** There were definitely some pros and cons to the changes they made with Medusa. This episode also showed us some tension between Percu, Annabeth and Grover. Back at camp, Percy is told he will be betrayed by someone he trusts and therefore hesitates to get close to his questmates. This was another key difference between the book and the show because the book trio had an immediate connection that allowed them to trust each other implicitly.

**Sanvi:** We also get a glimpse of Percy's sassy side in the well-known scene of Percy mailing Medusa's head to Olympus. It was comforting to see this scene survive in the TV series with all the changes made in the episode.

**Zoya:** We both loved the last scene, which featured Lin-Manuel Miranda as Hermes the Messenger God. He was seen delivering Percy's special package to the Empire State Building, or Olympus. We would rate this episode a 6/10, for all of the seemingly unnecessary changes they made.

#### **Episode 4: I Plunge to My Death**

Sanvi: This episode confused me. There were many changes in the plot compared to the book. One example is that the episode starts on a train where the trio is chased by Echidna, mother of monsters, and her pet Chimera. This did not occur in the book, where instead the kids encountered the monster in the St. Louis Arch while sightseeing.

**Zoya:** I agree. Another huge change was that when Percy was fighting the Chimera in the show, he fell through a hole in the floor that the Chimera had burned and dangled there before falling through. In the book, Percy prays to his father and chooses to jump out of the Arch into the Mississippi River below, escaping the Chimera after admitting that fighting it would be futile.

Sanvi: In addition, I noticed that Riordan changed this plot detail for the live-action series to account for the fact that it would be impossible to jump from the St. Louis Arch into the river as it is much too far. In the show, when Percy falls out of the hole, a hand of water snatches him up and breaks his fall.



**Zoya:** That was a change that made sense. One scene that I really liked in this episode was when Annabeth told Grover and Percy to save themselves and leave the Arch. Instead of leaving, Percy deceived Annabeth by offering her his sword, Riptide, and then quickly turning around to push her to safety. It was a cool maneuver to watch, and it showed the audience Percy's loyalty and bravery, traits

**Sanvi:** The episode concludes with Percy drowning in the river, when he hears a mysterious voice that tells him to breathe, and he discovers his underwater breathing abilities. Overall, due to the surprising setting change, we rate this a 7/10! The fighting and interactions between the characters were on point, but some details were confusing as they steered away from the book a lot.

that are emphasized in the book.

#### **Episode 5: A God Buys Us Cheeseburgers**

**Zoya:** The beginning of this episode was adorable, with Percy's reunion with Annabeth and Grover after he fell from the Arch in the previous episode. We see a lot of relationship development between Percy and Annabeth in this episode, as they are separated from Grover for much of it. They have deeper conversations and hug for the first time, which I'm sure the audience loved.

Sanvi: The episode continues as the trio discovers that they must travel to Santa Monica for the next step of their adventure. On their way, they meet the war god Ares, who makes an offer to help them if they retrieve his shield from an amusement park. I love the casting for Ares, as the actor truly exemplified the fiery personality of the god through his dialogue along with his signature leather jacket and motorcycle.

Zoya: The casting for Ares was definitely on point. Some of my favorite scenes of the series occurred in the amusement park that Ares sent the group to. However, in the show, only Annabeth and Percy go to the park, and Grover volunteers to stay behind with Ares. This was a surprising twist, as Grover plays an integral role in the park in the book. I wasn't sure what to expect with the interactions between Grover and Ares, and I was once again taken aback. Grover tries to fool Ares into a confession, as he thinks Ares is the one to steal the bolt. Seeing this manipulation from Grover felt odd, as Annabeth, Athena's child, is usually the schemer of the group.

Sanvi: I agree. Another huge difference between the book and the show was in how they retrieved Ares' shield. In the book, they find the shield in the Thrill Ride O' Love which is secretly a trap placed by the god Hephaestus. Percy and Annabeth face robotic spiders and are broadcast live to Olympus as a form of humiliation. None of this occurs in the show, however, where one of them must sacrifice themselves by turning to gold

while the other leaves with the shield. In this version, Percy turns to gold and Annabeth faces Hephaestus himself, convincing him to let them both leave. This was an interesting change that strengthened the bond between Percy and Annabeth but felt unnecessary as the book scene also provided this.

**Zoya:** I think the acting during that scene was skillful, and I can appreciate what the show was truing to do by adding more tension. However, I would have loved to see the robotic spiders portrayed in real life. At the end of the episode, after Annabeth and Percy return the shield to Ares, we get another huge cliffhanger. Grover claims he knows who stole the master bolt, which was a huge shock to me as none of them knew this until the book's last few chapters. I give this episode an 8.5/10 for the great acting, but the lack of the Thrill Ride O' Love scenes was disappointing.

#### **Episode 6: We Take a Zebra to Vegas**

Sanvi: The episode picks up with the trio taking a ride to Las Vegas in an animal transport vehicle. They manage to message Camp Half-Blood and reach Luke, who warns them about tension in the camp which is accurate to the book. The trio ends up at the Lotus Casino and falls under the trance of the Lotus spell, where they become distracted and forget about their mission. This scene is the same as in the book, however, it directly contrasts with the infamous Lightning Thief movie where the three kids fall into the same trap by eating lotus flowers which then distract them from their mission.

Zoya: I'm glad you mentioned the movie because the Lotus Casino scene was one of the things that fans enjoyed from it, even though it was not accurate to the books. Many, including me, were hopeful that "Poker Face" by Lady Gaga would be playing in this episode as it had in the movie. However, we were met with "Levitating" by Dua Lipa. Looking back, this song was probably a better fit for the younger audience as it was recently popular.

**Sanvi:** I have to admit, despite the more relevant song, I was secretly hoping for a return of the iconic "Poker Face". After the "Levitating" scene, fans were met with the reap-

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Zoya: Percy's driving was probably one of the best parts of this episode for me. I was just annoyed that there were so many other inaccuracies. For example, in Santa Monica, a naiad tells Percy that his team has missed the summer solstice deadline and has failed their mission. I was appalled by this, as Percy makes the deadline in the book. Another weird occurrence was that Naiad gave Percy four magic pearls that would save him, Grover, Annabeth and Percy's mother from the Underworld in the next episode. Percy is only gifted three pearls in the book, which heightens the tension as he is forced to choose who to save. I just felt that the extra pearl was unnecessary and irksome.

**Sanvi:** I would rate this episode fairly low, around 6/10 due to the inaccuracy and audacity of the plot changes. However, despite the changes, the episode brought back nostalgic scenes of the casino as well as new hilarious interactions between characters.

#### Episode 7: We Find Out the Truth, Sort of

Zoya: This episode's start was very jolting. We find Percy, Annabeth and Grover in a mattress store which they claim is the secret entrance to the Underworld. I didn't love this, as the entrance is the Hollywood sign in the book, which feels much more appropriate. They somehow already know that the owner of the store is Procrustes, an evil son of Poseidon. Contrastingly, in the book, the trio enters the store not knowing the monster that lives inside. The struggle between Percy and Procrustes, or "Crusty" as he is referred to, is very quick in the show, but it is more of a drawn-out battle of wit in the book. Overall, I entered the episode feeling disoriented and unsatisfied.

**Sanvi:** I felt the same way. The scene seemed rushed and unfinished, leaving many viewers confused. (Continued on Page 13)





The episode becomes more puzzling as it continues, showing the trio entering the Underworld that resembles neither the book's description nor the movie's portrayal. The setting depicts a rocky desert, whereas in both the book and movie the Underworld appears as a fiery inferno. This change in the environment was perplexing, as it did not represent the danger and peril that the characters faced. The disappointing CGI of the three-headed dog, Cerberus took away from these elements as well. This scene included Grover getting eaten by the dog, causing him to lose his magic pearl which brought them back to the

book-accurate number of three total.

Zoya: Yeah, I really disliked the whole getting-an-extra-pearl-then-losing-it plot. The show also added a scene where Annabeth becomes trapped in the Fields of Asphodel and must use another pearl to escape. This left Percy and Grover alone in the Underworld with only two pearls. This situation was similar to how Percy and Annabeth were alone in the amusement park in Episode 5. Dropping the trio down to two people multiple times in this first season was odd, as fans rarely imagine them separated.

Sanvi: This choice to send Annabeth home was surprising to me. With the trio down to just Percy and Grover, the pair found themselves at the familiar scene of Grover being dragged into the pit of Tartarus by the shoes that Luke gifted Percy. This allowed Percy to discover that the one behind the upcoming war was the titan Kronos. It was relieving to see accuracy in this scene, as it is a major plot point of the book. However, the later scene was portrayed differently with the sudden discovery of the lightning bolt in Percy's backpack. In the book, it was in front of Hades where it was revealed that Percy had been carrying the bolt the whole time, making him look guilty. However, in the show, Percy and Grover use the bolt to bargain with Hades to return Sally Jackson.

Zoya: Honestly, the Hades scene was difficult for me to watch. He was funny and nice in the show, which was very uncharacteristic of the God of Death. He didn't seem menacing or even frightening to Percy, who easily bargained with him. This episode was made better by the interspersed scenes we got of Sally Jackson and Poseidon's relationship when Percy was a little kid. Although these were not included in the book, I enjoyed seeing Sally's perspective on raising a demigod. I would give this episode a 5.5/10 for the 'crusty' CGI and odd plot changes.

#### **Episode 8: The Prophecy Comes True**

**Sanvi:** This episode was a roller coaster of a finale. It kicks off immediately with Percy confronting Ares in a duel that ultimately results in Percy winning Hades' helm of darkness with his use of water powers. This scene was very well acted out, with impressive stunts and dialogue on both sides. Percy then travels to Olympus to confront Zeus by reaching the 600th floor of the Empire State Building. The scene of meeting Zeus was interesting and well thought out. The actor of Zeus, Lance Reddick, mastered the portrayal of the intimidating and powerful character through his performance in this scene. This scene also featured the touching moment of Poseidon and Percy meeting for the first time, a significant point in both the show and the book.

Zoya: I feel like Percy is much more confrontational towards Zeus in the show. In the book, he is very nervous about approaching the god, but he does not hesitate in the show to criticize Zeus for starting a war between the gods. Poseidon appears here to save Percy from being destroyed by Zeus, and the father and son have a meaningful conversation. I liked seeing this new relationship begin between the two of them and hope to see more of it next season.

Sanvi: This ending broke me. The confrontation between Percy and Luke was possibly one of the most anticipated scenes in the show. It lived up to its hype and even went beyond in its details. For example, Luke's betrayal is especially heartbreaking after Percy apologizes for drawing Luke's blood in their duel. Additionally, in the show, Annabeth appears in the scene to face Luke and the breaking friendship between the two is especially painful to watch as the incredible acting truly brings the betrayal to another level. The episode ends with Percy, Annabeth and Grover parting ways for the year promising that no matter what happens they will be together next summer to face Luke and Kronos. I rate this episode a solid 9.9/10 for its incredible character performances and emotion.

#### **Overall Thoughts:**

**Zoya:** Both the beginning and end of this show were amazing, and although there were some scenes from the books that were cut out here and there, I definitely think it is worth watching.

**Sanvi:** I agree. Despite some inaccuracy, this show was binge-worthy and included impressive stunts, acting and nostalgia bringing joy to all Percy Jackson fans.

**Zoya:** I'm already missing the Tuesday night episode releases, and I can't wait for Season Two.


